

The EAGLE Evidence Collection Checklist

The Scene

Unsanitary living conditions or unsafe environment (e.g. bedroom, common room, bathroom, kitchen, basement) Presence or lack of food and drink, as well as the type of food and drink Weapons, instruments of abuse, and signs of struggle Locks on doors Recording equipment (inside and outside of the home or other building) Theft of property or personal items Computer, flash drives Presence of personal and financial records or other important papers Additional Information_____

Evidence of Abuse

Untreated or inadequately explained bruises, lacerations, abrasions, fractures, injuries, ligature marks, restraints, or pressure ulcers of victim or suspect Injuries to genital area or unexplained sexually transmitted infections Prior injury and wounds Inadequately explained or unusual mental status changes Clothing worn at the time of the incident Victim withdrawal, isolation, or reluctance to speak Unattended medical needs or inadequate level of care Additional Information _____

Medical, Psychological, Cognitive, and Functional Conditions

Current medical condition Apparent psychological condition (e.g. depression, anxiety) Perceived cognitive impairment Functional difficulties or frailty Assistive devices (e.g., walker, cane, hearing aids, glasses) Medications - prescription and over the counter (e.g., names, dosage, prescription date, expiration date, evidence of usage) Additional information_____

Medical Records

Medical records and reports, X-ray and lab reports, prescriptions, assessments, orders, and notes (e.g., chronic medical conditions, function impairment, and frailty), from the emergency department, clinical care, hospital, long-term care facility, or institution.

Records, reports, assessments, and notes (e.g., evaluation, confinement)

Psychological records, assessments, reports, and notes (e.g., capacity evaluation) Relevant records maintained by various professionals, including treating clinician, primary care clinicians, pharmacists, dentists, wound care specialists, sexual assault nurse examiner, or medical examiners

Criminal record and history (e.g. prior misdemeanor or felony charges and convictions) Past or ongoing adult protective service reports Past or existing court orders (e.g., elder abuse restraining orders, domestic violence restraining orders, guardianship or conservatorship proceedings) Civil cases Property deeds and transfers Arrest reports, field identification cards, or 911 calls and recordings Additional Information _____

Financial Records - Victim and Suspect

Bank and investment accounts, including statements, signatories, and ATM transfers Credit reports Credit cards, including statements and authorized users Checkbook registers and endorsed checks Receipts or documentation of the purchase or transfer of real or personal property Suspicious activity reports (SARs) and currency transaction reports (CTRs) Additional Information

Interviews

Victim, witness, and alleged perpetrator(s) Adult protective services caseworkers or long-term care ombudspersons Health care professionals with knowledge of the parties, facts, or circumstances Other individuals who interacted with or observed the victim or alleged perpetrator(s) Additional Information

Documentation

Photographs of injuries and wounds, crime scene, home, and other relevant areas Surveillance video Social media accounts Body-worn video Recordings of victim, perpetrator, and witness statements, including demeanor, interactions, and verbal/non-verbal conduct Additional Information
